AIRPORT NOISE by Fred Konkell, MHACC President

Many of us on the Marine Hills Architectural Control Committee have been contacted in various ways about what we residents perceive as increased airport noise levels as a result of the third runway at SeaTac Airport. We have received letters, email and phone calls addressing this concern. There have been articles in both the Federal Way Mirror and the Seattle Times about this issue. We on the Committee feel that this threatens the life style of our community and have attempted to bring about some remedies.

On Monday, August 15, MHACC President Fred Konkell and Treasurer Jim Simpson were included in a meeting with staffers from US Congressman Adam Smith's office. The staff people were Debra Entenman from his Tacoma office and Paul Hoover from his Washington DC office. Also attending the meeting were Federal Way City Council Member Linda Kochmar, Federal Way Mayor Skip Priest and Lakehaven Utility District Commissioner Len Englund.

Linda, Jim, and I laid out our concerns and expressed frustration with the Port and the FAA for not responding to any of our collective queries. We presented a file of information to both Council Member Kochmar and the Staff people that included complaints and newspaper articles as well as other informational documents. We were asked to offer some suggestions on what steps the Port could take to minimize the noise impact in our neighborhood.

The following are some of the suggestions we submitted:

- 1. Require the airlines to follow the takeoff guidelines that now exist. Many of the airplanes start turning short of the 320th Street marker causing increases in noise levels.
- 2. Impose a moratorium on middle of the night freighter takeoffs. Right now there is a middle of the night takeoff that awakens people and shakes houses. These flights are not passenger sensitive and could be scheduled to leave during daylight hours.
- Adopt the new GPS guidance system which would lengthen and even out the glide paths of airplanes and reduce noise levels.
- 4. Include Marine Hills in the noise abatement zone. Marine Hills gets about 260 minutes a day of 65 decibels noise levels, yet we are not included in the abatement zone. The 65 decibel level has historically been the benchmark for inclusion in the abatement zone. Including Marine Hills in the abatement zone would make Federal sound suppression funding available to our residents.

These and other options were discussed. The staffers assured us that they would take these suggestions under consideration and see what could be done to help provide some relief from the airport noise. Jim and Fred felt that we put our concerns out there and now it remains to be seen what type of actions will be taken to reduce this impact.

The best way for Marine Hills' residents to express their discontent with increased airplane noise (from the 3rd runway) is to simply call the SeaTac Noise Hotline [206-787-5393] and voice your complaint(s). Call as many times as your level of frustration justifies.

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THEFT OF MHACC PROPERTY

This year, the MHACC invested in "no soliciting" signs in response to increased and aggressive solicitors in the neighborhood. This included three large signs posted at the entrances as well as smaller signs posted throughout the neighborhood. Unfortunately, all of the signs disappeared from the neighborhood within two months of posting them. MHACC members checked with the city to see if they had been removed by code enforcement and the city had no knowledge of the signs being removed. This only leaves the possibility of theft either by kids or solicitors. If you have noticed anything unusual or happen to know anything about the removal of our signs, please let the MHACC know. Many neighbors reported that the signs were working quite well at keeping unwanted visitors out of Marine Hills. In response, new signs have been installed at a cost of \$232.20.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR SIDEWALK

The MHACC has received several complaints about overgrown yards encroaching on the sidewalks in the neighborhood. During the spring and summer, it is not uncommon for shrubs and bushes to grow quickly over pedestrian walkways. The sidewalk and parking strip (the landscaped area between the sidewalk and curb) in front of your home are the responsibility of the property owner to maintain. These can be maintained with simple pruning and weed control products. Keeping these areas under control helps keep up the overall appearance while also increasing property values in Marine Hills. Also, many of our neighbors enjoy walking and running in Marine Hills. Let's help them out by keeping the sidewalks clear. Thanks!

THE NEIGHBORHOOD NAUGHTY LIST

You talked, we listened! The MHACC has received several letters asking for increased enforcement by our property monitors. We are also receiving a record number of complaints and requests for assistance with covenant violations. In response to this matter, the MHACC will begin publishing The Naughty List in our 2012 Covenant Courier Newsletter. This list will include the addresses of properties currently in violation of Marine Hills covenants. The goal is to bring attention to the bylaws of living in Marine Hills and make neighbors more accountable to each other. If your address is published on the list it will be removed and acknowledged with a big thank you once the covenant violation has been resolved.

Examples of current violations reported to the MHACC or identified by our property monitors during their twice annual drivearounds are:

- 1. Trees blocking the view of an adjoining property.
- 2. Recreational vehicles in driveway or on the street.
- 3. Garbage/junk in front of property.
- 4. Overgrown yards.

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If you do not want your home published on The Naughty List in 2012, take a look around and make sure your property complies with the assigned covenants. These are available on www.mhacc.net along with FAQ's on our covenants. Also, you can simply enter your address on our website to receive the appropriate covenant for your home. Covenant violations can dramatically affect property values in Marine Hills. Let's help our neighbors out by staying off The Naughty List!

MORE LAWN STUFF by Fred Konkell

In the spring issue of the Covenant Courier I wrote an article on the costs of maintaining a green lawn during the hot, dry summer months. This article will address a few other measures that will help maintain a good looking green lawn.

Lawns in the Pacific Northwest are susceptible to lawn diseases. The two most common diseases are red thread and rust. Red thread is easy to identify. Just check your lawn in areas that are difficult to keep green and look for grass blades that look like, you guessed it, red threads. The blades will be significantly thinner than the rest of the blades and are definitely red. This disease can easily be moved around your yard by your lawn mower and, if you have a lawn service that doesn't use good equipment cleanliness practices, can be moved from lawn to lawn. Lawn rust is also easy to identify. If your lawn has a yellowish orange look, inspect some of the blades. The rust appears as an oval shaped spot and there will be multiple spots on a blade. Both of these diseases are easy to control. The Bayer Company makes a product called Bayer Fungus Control for Lawns. Follow the application instructions on the label. You may have to make several applications to get control of the disease.

There are also two lawn insects that can make your lawn look less than stellar. The first insect to look for is the crane fly. The adult crane fly which looks like a giant mosquito appears in mid to late summer and likes to land high on walls. This adult hatches from a grub that lives in the lawn and feeds on the roots. If you see a large number of the adults, the larva, or grub, needs to be dispatched in mid-spring.

The other nasty lawn insect is the lawn moth. There are two ways to detect this invader. The lawn moths also eat roots and if you have large brown areas in your lawn it is likely that they are present. One method of detection is to check your lawn on a dewy morning. If you see glisteny spidery webs, then lawn moths are present. The other method for detection is to walk across the brown areas on a hot afternoon. The lawn moths will flit up in the air about ankle high and drop back down to the ground. An application of Bayer Lawn Insect Control mid-spring will control both of these insects all season long. I use a broadcast spreader to apply either of these Bayer products. A broadcast spreader helps to get even distribution. Always follow label directions when applying pesticides.

Remember that fall is the time to buy and plant spring blooming bulbs. The rule of thumb is "the larger the bulb size, the larger the bloom".
