Maintenance and Beautification of Marine Hills' Entrances

For many years, the Friends of Ninth Place South and the Friends of Eleventh Place South have voluntarily cared for the entrance gardens to present an aesthetically pleasing welcome to our neighborhood for both residents and visitors. These two (2) completely voluntary groups are comprised primarily of Marine Hills' women residents, although on occasion some Marine Hills' men volunteer their time to repair water lines and deal with water-related issues, solve electrical problems, and correct damage from a rare act of vandalism on entrance signs or gardens. When departing or entering Marine Hills coincident with one or more members of these voluntary groups performing garden maintenance, roll a window down and thank them for their good work. Oh, incidentally, any Marine Hills' residents who would like to volunteer for ork at the entrances would be most welcomed.

To provide some color to the entrances during the grayness of winter, primroses were planted by these volunteers in January 2017. Soon, as the last vestiges of winter are overtaken by budding trees, bushes and shrubs, and flowers bursting forth to welcome the gradual increase in daily sunlight (no connection to daylight saving time) associated with spring, the volunteers will brighten up the entrance gardens with colorful annuals. As many of you have undoubtedly noticed at the Ninth Place South entrance, there is a significant difference between the garden on the west side of the entrance *vis-a-vis* that on the east side of the en-

rance *vis-a-vis* that on the east side of the entrance in terms of lushness of foliage, plant vigor, and floral output. The difference can be attributed to the water-greedy evergreens that surround the east side garden, denying the bushes, flowers and plants the water needed to encourage the same level of growth seen in the west side garden even though the same flowers were planted in both gardens at the same time.

On 20 June 2016, a group of Marine Hills' ladies met to discuss how the spirit of voluntary compliance with the covenants could be rekindled across the entirety of Marine Hills to the betterment of our special neighborhood. These women, many of whom have served on the Marine Hills Architectural Control Committee in the past, have served or are now serving in a voluntary capacity to keep our entrances presentable and attractive, and have lived in Marine Hills for many decades, are the bedrock upon which Marine Hills stands. The brief report shown below describes their idea(s) about improving the presentation of the neighborhood and was written by Muriel Haegele of the ladies' group, now named "Marine Hills Entrance Volunteers".

"Last summer the Marine Hills Entrance Volunteers, in an effort to preserve the reputation of Marine Hills as one of the most beautiful neighborhoods in Federal Way, walked through the neighborhood and identified yards that had weeds, shrubs and trees that were in need of pruning and lawns that needed mowing. We then contacted several home owners, either personally or by letter, inviting them to take the necessary steps to help keep Marine Hills a beautiful neighborhood. We thank those who have taken the effort to improve the appearance of their yards and are hopeful that with spring arriving all families will take a good look at their yards and through pruning, weeding and lawn maintenance help make Marine Hills a neighborhood we can all be proud of."

The Most Invasive Neighbor?

PortOfSeattle.com shows Sea-Tac airport is the fastest growing (of the top 20 airports) in the USA. Over the 2-year period from 2014-2015, Sea-Tac added more than 7 million passengers, nearly matching the previous 10 years' increase. Preliminary numbers for 2016 show an additional 7 million. The total number of take-offs or landings increased 18% to 412,170 last year. That averages 1,129 times PER DAY an aircraft lands or departs!

The Century Agenda states goals and visions for the next 25 years at SeaTac. This includes TRIPLING the air cargo volume. Freighters are often heavy, wide-body aircraft and I suspect they will be nighttime operations. Another goal for SeaTac is to become the gateway to Asia. As per their May 4th announcement, they plan to spend \$38 million for Concourse D Terminal. Building a gateway means many more transiting passengers. Their contribution to our economy will be minimal, maybe a cup of coffee in between gates. However, the cost to our neighborhoods in pollution is significant.

In a joint Port of Seattle (POS) and FAA meeting in early May, the FAA presented slides showing the volume of complaints year over year about SEATAC flights. Their slides pointed out many of the calls were from a few people. After removing them, they said the complaints have only increased commensurate to the increase in flights. They use the complaint call volume as the primary determination of impact to a neighborhood. If you haven't called in over a year, they will use that against you to build an argument that people don't care.

It is my opinion we need someone on the POS's board to balance the business interests. We are the community they are serving. The quality of life is diminishing quickly with the air traffic increase. Sleep deprivation, often caused from 2AM take-offs of wide-body aircraft, will likely increase if we continue to allow the port to chase dollars at our cost.

I also believe a restriction is needed for flights between 11pm and 6am. The FAA tracks sound not as individual events, but as an average sound level over 24 hours. This is fundamentally flawed as humans do not perceive a short, very loud event followed by a long silence as an average of those.

We may never return to enjoying summer dinners on our decks, or even inside with the windows open, but we should at a minimum be able to sleep. Many airports around our nation (and the world) have more restrictive curfews while their cities continue to prosper.

Please, call the FAA, the port, congress and senate members, and tell them there HAS to be a balance as air traffic continues to increase. Our property values, quality of life, mental health, and physical health depend on it.

Consider telling the Port Of Seattle that the way they track noise (DNL) using an average over 24 hours is ridiculous.
